


SE CORNER OF HICKORY STREET & THIRD AVENUE, WARREN

Francis Henry and George Parmlee built a block of fine buildings on Hickory Street with this building housing City Hall, the Fire Department, and the Hickory Street Livery Stable. The brick livery stable was two stories high with a basement and was known as the finest building devoted to livery stable purposes in Western Pennsylvania. Photograph circa 1873.

Warren's Union School (right), built between 1854 and 1856, facing Third Avenue, was the town's first free public school. By 1870, the building had become overcrowded, so, in 1871, a three-story Italian Renaissance brick structure (left), known as the Central School, was added to the original building. In 1897, a new high school was built on the southeast corner of Market Street and Second Avenue.

Warren Union School was razed circa 1900, and the Central School was demolished in 1936.


This is now the site of the City of Warren's Municipal Building.

Andrews was the first Burgess. The current Municipal Building was constructed between 1936 and 1937, replacing a 70-year-old structure that had surpassed its economic usefulness. The plan is H-shaped, providing offices for the burgess, clerk, city engineer, and police department. There is a pistol range in the basement, a jail, and space for future expansion.
