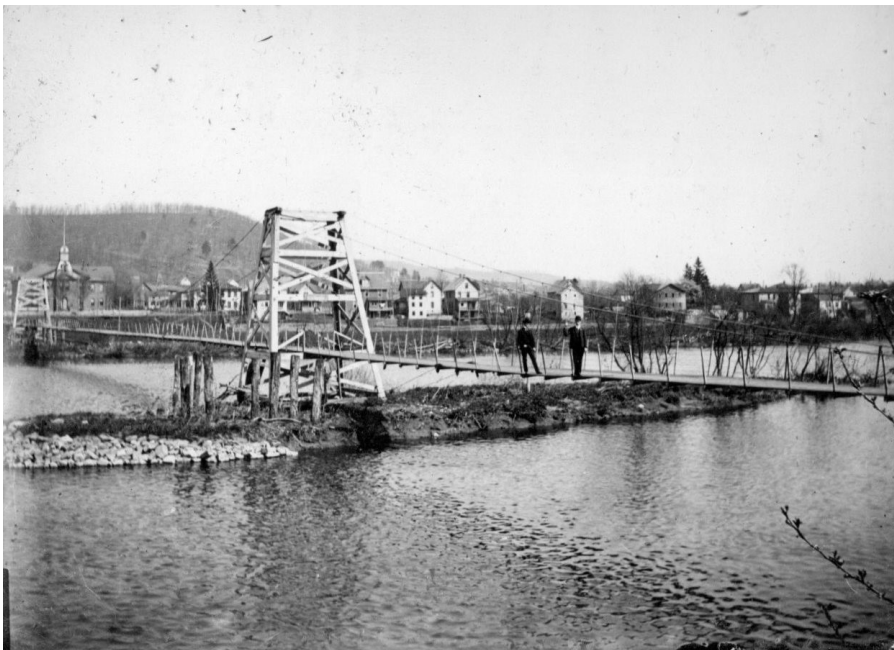

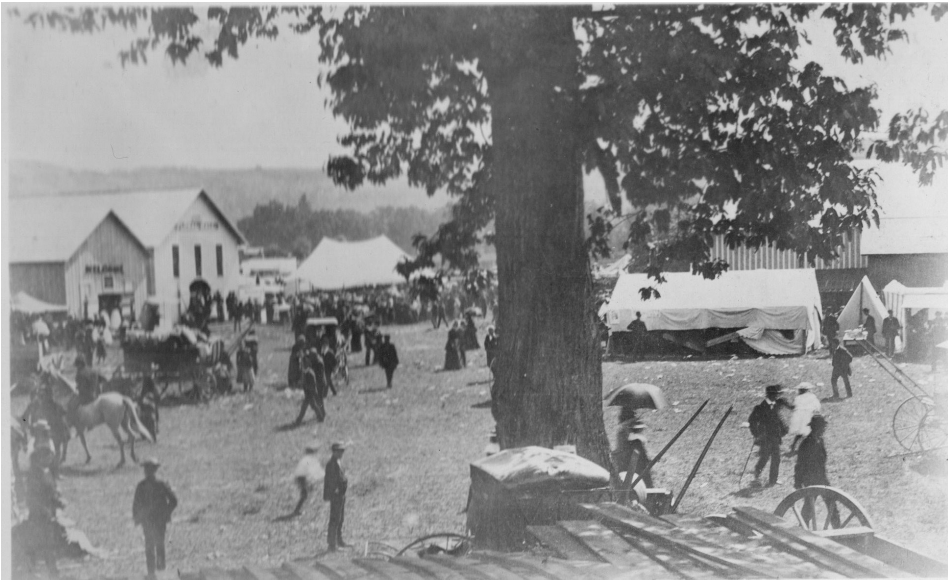


Water and Hickory Streets, Warren, Pa., circa 1862

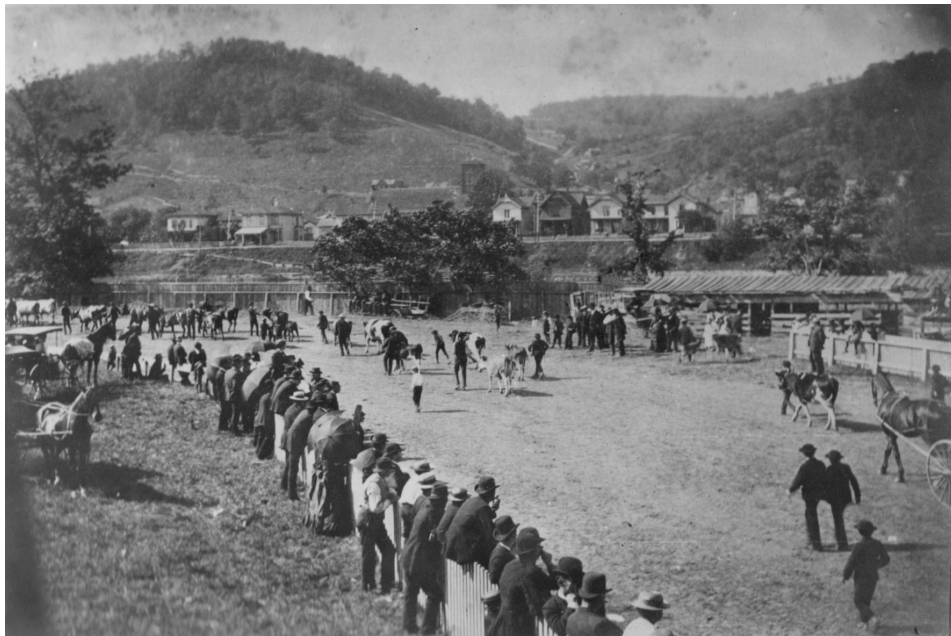
Water Street was renamed Pennsylvania Avenue circa 1903

Carver House — 402-404 Water Street — West of Hickory Street

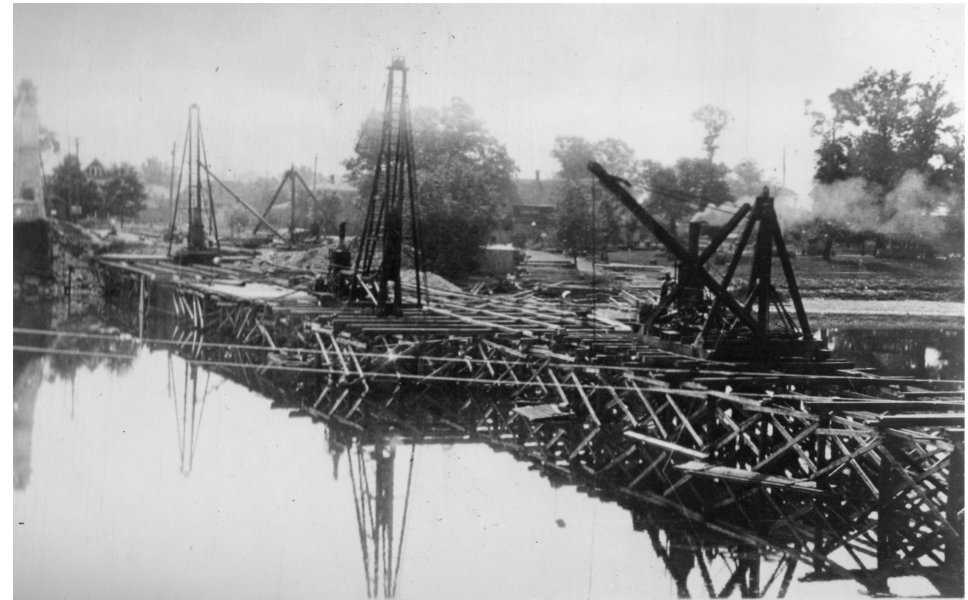
Citizens National Bank — 400 Water Street — East of Hickory Street

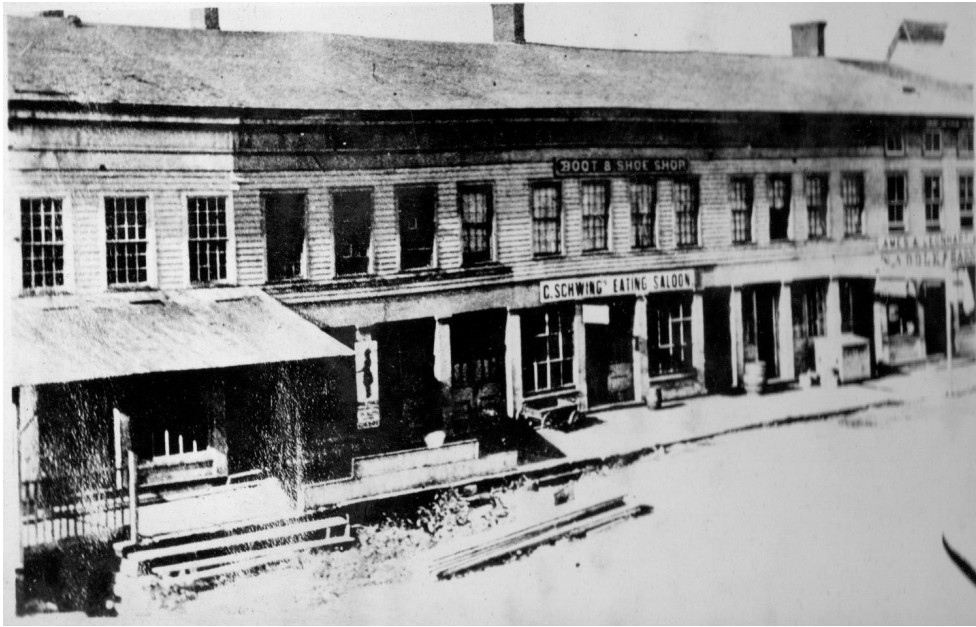

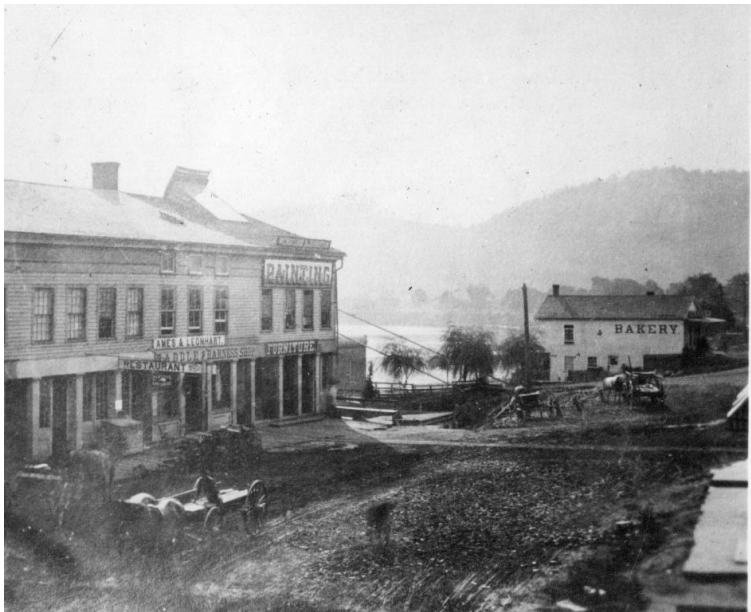

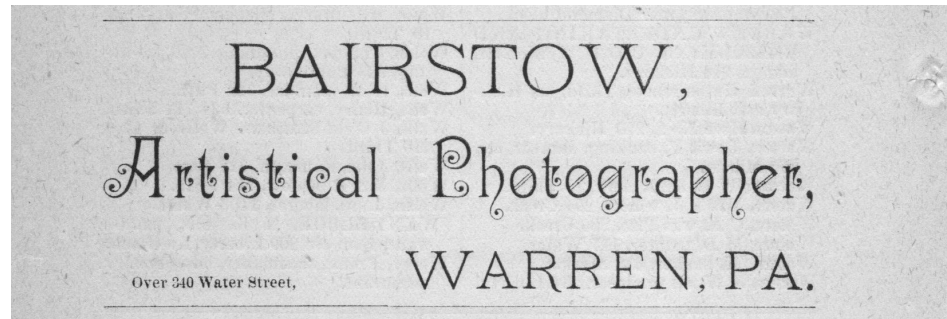


Warren County Fair on the South Side of Warren, 1894

*James R. Bairstow
Founder of Bairstow Studio*

In 1873,
James R. Bairstow
opened the Bairstow Studio
at 340 Water Street in Warren.
During the Spanish-American War,
David F. Bairstow entered the photographic
business with his father James.

In 1917, during WWI,
the studio was moved to
219 Liberty Street in Warren.

In 1961,
David F. Bairstow passed the family business
on to his son James Robert Bairstow.

The Warren County Historical Society
Bairstow Collection consists of photographs,
negatives, glass plate negatives, and tin types
dating back to Civil War times.
